Participation in the distance learning dual credit classes is limited to the first 32 students who apply AND meet the requirements. Slots will be filled on a first come, first serve basis. To be eligible, the student must meet two of the four requirements listed below:

- Score 23 or better on the ACT test with a 19 or better on the English and Math sections
- Score in the Advance Measure category on the English II STAAR test with a score of 3 or better on the essay portion
- Rank in the top 30% of their class
- Final grade of 92 in English II or III

English 1301 (8060)

Prereq: English I, II and/or III Grade 11-12 Credit:1

Principles and techniques of written, expository, and persuasive composition; analysis of literary, expository and persuasive texts, and critical thinking will be covered. Designed to improve reading skills through the use of thought-provoking material on which to base training in expository writing. Study of grammar and sentence structure will be integrated with the student's needs as reading and writing skills improve. Outside reading devoted chiefly to nonfiction, especially material in which general information is stressed.

English 1302 (8060)

Prereq: English 1301 Grade 11-12 Credit: 1

Principles and techniques of written, expository and persuasive composition; analysis of literary, expository and persuasive texts; and critical thinking will be covered.. Includes analysis of prose readings, expository writing and investigative methods of research. Readings will include the mail literary types. A more intensive application of grammar will be required in an effort to improve the correctness and precision of the students' writing.

English 2322 (8065)

Prereq: English 1301/1302 Grade: 12 Credit:1/2

A survey of the development of British literature from the Anglo-Saxon period to the Eighteenth Century. Students will study works of prose, poetry, drama, and fiction in relation to their historical linguistic, and cultural context. Texts will be selected from a diverse group of authors and traditions.

English 2323 (8065)

Prereq: English 2322

Grade: 12

Credit: ½

A survey of the development of British literature from the Romantic period to the present. Students will study works of prose, poetry, drama, and fiction in relation to their historical linguistic, and cultural context. Texts will be selected from a diverse group of authors and traditions.

History 1301 (8055)- United States History I

Prereq: None

Grade: 11

Credit: ½

A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era to the Civil War/Reconstruction period. United States History I includes the study of pre-Columbian, colonial, revolutionary, early national, slavery and sectionalism, and the Civil War/Reconstruction eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History I include: American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, and creation of the federal government. **This class is an online class provided by Howard College.**

History 1302 (8055) - United States History II

Prereq: History 1301

Grade: 11

Credit: ½

A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the Civil War/Reconstruction era to the present. United States History II examines industrialization, immigration, world wars, the Great Depression, Cold War and post-Cold War eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History II include: American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, urbanization and suburbanization, the expansion of the federal government, and the study of U.S. foreign policy. **This class is an online class provided by Howard College.**

Government 2301 (8052)

Prereq: None

Grade: 12

Credit: ½

Introduction to the theory and practice of politics and government in America at the national, state, and local levels, with special attention to Texas. Topics include political theory, the American and Texas constitutions, federalism, political participation and elections, the institutions of government, and domestic and foreign policy. **This class is an online class provided by Howard College.**

Principles of Macroeconomics (8053)

Prereq: None

Grade: 12

Credit: ½

History, development and application of macroeconomic theory underlying the production, distribution and exchange of goods and services including the utilization of resources, analysis of value and prices, national income analysis, fiscal policies, monetary and banking theory and policy, distribution of income, labor problems, international economics, and economics systems. Attention given to the application of economic principles to economic problems. **This class is an online class provided by Howard College.**
